Carolyn O'Bagy Davis is the choice for OneBook Arizona 2011. She is the author of *Hopi Summer, Letters from Ethel to Maud*.

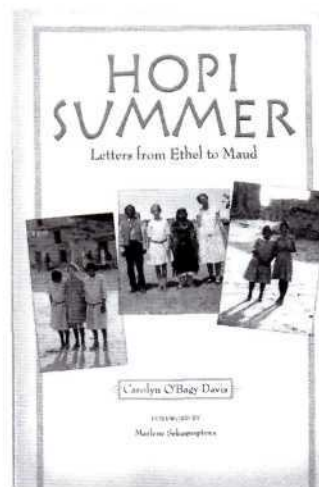

world of information at the library.

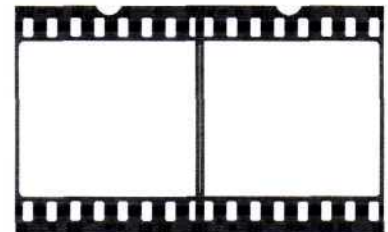

## Fun Facts From History.com:

On March 23rd in 1839, the initials "O.K." are first published in *The Boston Morning Post*.

Meant as an abbreviation for "oll correct," a popular slang misspelling of "all correct" at the time, OK steadily made its way into the everyday speech of Americans.

During the late 1830s, it was a favorite practice

among younger, educated circles to misspell words intentionally, then abbreviate them and use them as slang when talking to one another. Just as teenagers today have their own slang based on distortions of common words, such as "kewl" for "cool" or "DZ" for "these," the "in crowd" of the 1830s had a whole host of slang terms

they abbreviated. Popular abbreviations included "KY" for "No use" ("know yuse"), "KG" for "No go" ("know go"), and "OW" for all right ("oll wright").

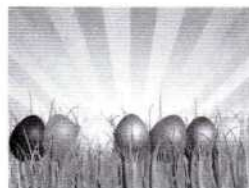

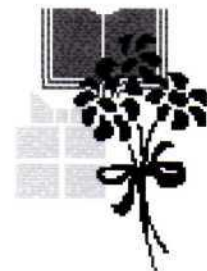

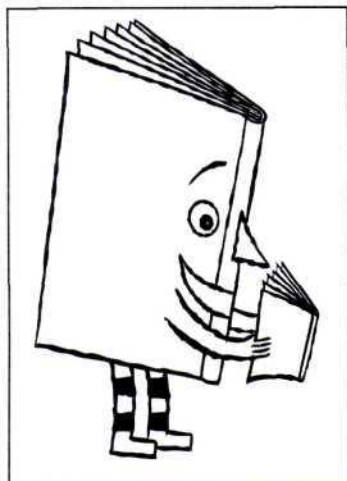

## Interesting Tidbits by Mary Ann Gove

One of the more humorous stories in Arizona history is about Miami, Arizona. In December, 1909, the post office was established in a tiny building that could be hauled on the back of a flatbed truck. This

post office was stationed on a corner in the new little town, and the surrounding lots were soon sold. When the lots were sold, and the money had been made, they would move the post office to another area

and proceed to overcharge for the lots in that section of town. It was a novel way to peddle real estate, and make more than what the lots were worth, as most newcomers wanted

property close to the post office and would pay the asking price only to wake up one morning and find the post office was gone!
